A King to Behold:

Scott Hahn Reflects on the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord

An “epiphany” is an appearance. In today’s readings, with their rising stars, splendorous lights, and mysteries revealed, the face of the child born on Christmas day appears.

Herod, in today’s Gospel, asks the chief priests and scribes where the Messiah is to be born. The answer Matthew puts on their lips says much more, combining two strands of Old Testament promise—one revealing the Messiah to be from the line of David (see [2 Samuel 2:5](#)), the other predicting “a ruler of Israel” who will “shepherd his flock” and whose “greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth” (see [Micah 5:1–3](#)).

Those promises of Israel’s king ruling the nations resound also in today’s Psalm. The psalm celebrates David’s son, Solomon. His kingdom, we sing, will stretch “to the ends of the earth,” and the world’s kings will pay Him homage. That’s the scene too in today’s First Reading, as nations stream from the East, bearing “gold and frankincense” for Israel’s king.



The Magi’s pilgrimage in today’s Gospel marks the fulfillment of God’s promises. The Magi, probably Persian astrologers, are following the star that Balaam predicted would rise along with the ruler’s staff over the house of Jacob (see [Numbers 24:17](#)).

Laden with gold and spices, their journey evokes those made to Solomon by the Queen of Sheba and the “kings of the earth” (see [1 Kings 10:2, 25](#); [2 Chronicles 9:24](#)). Interestingly, the only other places where frankincense and myrrh are mentioned together are in songs about Solomon (see [Song of Songs 3:6; 4:6, 14](#)).

One greater than Solomon is here (see [Luke 11:31](#)). He has come to reveal that all peoples are “co-heirs” of the royal family of Israel, as today’s Epistle teaches.

His manifestation forces us to choose: will we follow the signs that lead to Him as the wise Magi did? Or will we be like those priests and scribes who let God’s words of promise become dead letters on an ancient page?


JESSE TREE

Sunday, January 6, 2019, Feast of the Epiphany: **THREE CROWNS**



Three Wise Men from the East saw a star in the heavens that led them to seek the newborn King of the Jews. They followed it to Bethlehem, where it stopped over the humble abode of the Holy Family. Although they themselves were powerful men in the world, they humbled themselves before the Christ Child and paid Him homage. They offered Jesus the gifts they had brought for Him, gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. It is held that the gold was for His royalty, the frankincense for His divinity, and the myrrh – a burial ointment – as a symbol of the fact that this Babe was born to die. King Herod had wanted them to report back to them where this newborn King was, but they were warned in a

dream that Herod had evil intentions and they returned to their country by another way. **Matt 2:1-12**



FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY


Today is the Feast of the Epiphany, which celebrates the visit of the Magi to the Christ Child. “Epiphany,” from Greek roots meaning “to **show, to display,**” means “**manifestation.**”

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church “the

Epiphany is the manifestation of Jesus as Messiah of Israel, Son of God and Savior of the world. The great feast of Epiphany celebrates the adoration of Jesus by the wise men (*magi*) from the East, together with His baptism in the Jordan and the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee” (CCC 528).

Most nativity scenes feature three Magi presenting the Baby King with gifts of frankincense, gold, and myrrh while He was still in the manger. While scripture tells us of the gifts, their exact number is unknown and it unlikely that these men were royalty, or that they arrived while Jesus was still an infant. In his *Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives*, Pope Benedict XVI wrote that the Magi were likely of the Persian priestly caste; drawn to Bethlehem by a prophecy heralding the birth of an important king. It is also unlikely, given the timing of the Magi’s visit to King Herod and Herod’s command to slaughter all male children up to the age of two years old, that they arrived while Jesus was still a newborn. Scriptural and historical indications led early Church writers to believe they visited after the Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple, before the angel commanded St. Joseph to take the Holy Family to safety in Egypt when Jesus was perhaps a year or more old.

All of this takes nothing away from the beautiful custom of acknowledging their long and arduous journey to pay homage to the newborn King of Kings. Rather, it exhorts us to do the same not just this holy feast day, but every day in our making a home for Him – Who had no place to lay His head – in our hearts.


New Bulletin Coming!

We are happy to report that our 12th annual Christmas Program at the Pennington County Jail on December 19th was a joyous success for all involved, thanks be to God. Twenty-two carolers, including Fr. Brian Christensen, 3 guitar players, and one flutist from 4 parishes participated in the program. We distributed 705 candy bags for the inmates and 1,410 Christmas cards with stamped envelopes. The response of the Jail officials to our efforts was very positive:

"Everyone seemed to enjoy the carols very much, and the candy made a huge impact. While the inmates will always be inmates and this happiness is temporary, this also helps us as officers build rapport with the inmates...We would like to pass on to HFNL ministry our sincere thanks for their efforts. They made a huge difference for all of us."

Our long-time ministry member Bill Gradoville sums our ministry efforts up best:

"Our goal is to bring some hope to all of the inmates to whom we minister. The hope that they will take what we talk about each week and apply it to their lives. The hope that when they return to society they will be more likely to change their lives so they do not end up incarcerated again. The hope that they will accept God and Jesus Christ into their lives permanently, so they will be the Moms and Dads their children need them to be. All of us will be better off if this can happen."


